Meeker IOOF building makes Register of Historic Places

MEEKER History Colorado recently announced the listing of International Order of Odd Fellows (IOOF) Valentine Lodge No. 47 in Meeker on the National Register of Historic Places, that designation taking place March 19.

The IOOF lodge provided a social venue for community members who assisted fellow members in times of need. The 1896 building's second floor provided a meeting place for lodge members and a community meeting place for more than 96 years.

Local civil engineer Herman Pfeiffer designed the building that contains more than 240,000 bricks from a local kiln. Construction was complete in 1897 followed by a grand opening on April 26, 1897. The

two-story brick building is an excellent example of a late 19th and early 20th century Revival style and has been changed very little since constructed.

As with many IOOF buildings, the lodge formed an investment opportunity with the construction of a two-part commercial building: the IOOF lodge space on the upper level and the IOOF leasing the first floor to offices or for retail.

Rio Blanco County was the first tenant with offices in the front of the first floor and a small jail behind the offices. A large dance floor existed behind the jail and the one-story rear portion housed a community room, which continues today to provide community meeting and event space.

Over the years, the lodge and other organizations hosted various dinners, dances,

plays and other events in the building.

Between 1900 and 1930, the IOOF and the Woodmen of America hosted an annual joint community fish fry. The June 1920 fish fry drew more than 1,000 people from Western Colorado and a few Denver delegates.

During the 1940s and 1950s, the community room in the one-story rear section, served as a community roller skating rink.

In 1993, the IOOF Lodge of Meeker surrendered its charter as only a few members remained.

Mountain Valley Bank purchased the building in 2004. It had been unused for many years and fallen into poor condition. The bank restored the building to its original grandeur, constructed the drive-up banking canopy on the west side and rehabilitated the

first floor for use as the bank. For more information on the IOOF Lodge building and its history, please visit Mountain Valley Bank.

The National Register of Historic Places is the official federal list of districts, sites, buildings, structures and objects significant in American history, architecture, archaeology, engineering and culture. These sites contribute to an understanding of the historical and cultural foundations of the nation.

Authorized under the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, the National Register is part of a national program to coordinate and support public and private efforts to identify, evaluate and protect our historic and archeological resources.

The National Park Service provides overall program administration. The Office of Archaeology and Historic Preservation

(OAH) in History Colorado administers the register in Colorado. OAH assists property owners in listing Colorado's most historically and architecturally significant buildings, structures and sites in the National Register of Historic Places and the Colorado State Register of Historic Properties.

In Colorado, there are more than 1,500 properties listed on the National Register and more than 2,000 listed in the State Register. Properties listed in the National or State registers may be eligible for investment tax credits or for grants from the State Historical Fund, another program of the History Colorado. OAH staff is available to assist with the initial assessments of eligibility and to provide guidance in the completion of Register nominations.

Seven seeking seat on Rangely hospital board

RANGELY Voters will elect two of seven candidates to the Rangely District Hospital (RDH) board of directors in a coordinated polling place election with the Western Rio Blanco Metropolitan (WRBM) Recreation and Park District May 6.

One candidate will replace Rob Mackey, who will term out of his position next month, while board appointee John Payne, who filled board member Marty Estes' position when Estes moved last November, will attempt to maintain his seat on the board. Other candidates include Charles (Rick) Brady, Michael Dillon, Jason Kurrasch, Jennifer Moore, Tad Moss and Nathaniel (Nate) Polley.

Payne, who owns Giovanni's Italian Grill, accepted the board appointment because he believed his background could help the district improve its stated commitment to customer service.

"As a business person and someone who works in the service industry, I felt one of the weaknesses the hospital had was customer service, and I thought I could bring my expertise to the table and help with that," Payne said.

He is running for his current seat, he said, to help move the hospital toward the potential he believes it has.

"I just feel like RDH has a great opportunity with the new hospital (building) to be better than it is, and I want to be part of helping that happen," he said.

If elected, Payne said he wants to be part of a board that understands and carries out its roles, among them helping identify directions administrators should or could be taking and ensuring that the hospital's activities are transparent.

Payne has 20 years of experience on church boards and three years serving on Rangely's lodging tax board.

Candidate Charles (Rick) Brady has held various management positions with Blue Mountain Energy Co. for more than 24 years of employment, retiring from the Deserado

Meeker Lions Club fills valuable role as town's only service club

MEEKER If you look around at almost any social event during the year in Meeker, chances are good the Meeker Lions Club is there, helping out, bartending at this weekend's After Birth Ball or sponsoring last weekend's annual Easter egg hunt or putting on a barbecue at the Rio Blanco County Fair.

Lions Club President Tom Allen, completing his second term as president of the club in May, is proud of the club, which is just now winding up its 90th year in Meeker.

"We've got 54 members in the club, and we stay pretty active," Allen said. "There aren't many weeks we aren't doing something."

The Lions Club is the only service club in Meeker, but they often fill the gaps that other service clubs might carry out.

The overall mission of Lions clubs around the world is eye care.

"We provide eyeglasses to the needy in Meeker and Rangely," he said. "We have even provided eye

surgeries in some cases and we make various contributions to families with other medical needs as well."

The club also contributed \$1,700 to Dr. Robert Dorsett's 2014 Belize trip for Meeker High School students headed to Belize to work with dolphins and do dolphin research.

The list of events that the Lions annually take part in includes: running 12 to 15 cash bars at events in the area; providing lunches for special days for the ERBM Recreation District; providing lunches twice a year for Colorado Parks and Wildlife meetings; provide breakfasts for the 9Health Fair (held last weekend) and for Breakfast with Santa, sponsoring the Easter egg hunt (held last weekend) and the group also does Christmas tree sales.

On the Fourth of July, the group has concessions at the Rio Blanco County Fairgrounds; the club offers lunch at the Meeker Championship Sheepdog Trials; and they hold bingo two nights a month from October through May,

raising money for the scholarships that will go to Meeker High School seniors (last year the club gave eight \$500 scholarships to the seniors).

Other outside projects include painting and maintaining the school administration building and there is a project under way to build benches in memory of attorney George Benner.

Lions clubs are international philanthropic organizations working under the motto of "Leadership, Intelligence and Our Nation's Security."

With the main mission of Lions clubs globally being centered on vision, Allen said the club gives several pairs of glasses annually between Rangely and Meeker.

"With no Lions Club in Rangely, we include them with the glasses," Allen said. "If anyone at any time has old glasses laying around the house or gets a new pair of glasses, all they have to do is give those glasses to a member of the club, and they will be examined

Complaints heard, but MSD board to face painful cuts in budget

MEEKER The Meeker School District (MSD) Re-1 Education Board will have a work session April 30 followed by a special executive session during which employee contracts are subject to renewal and teachers and principals will be evaluated. Decisions must be made during the board meeting, after the executive session.

Superintendent Mark Meyer had prepared recommendations for certified contract renewals for last Monday night's board meeting but tabled his recommendations after public pleas to consider other budget cuts before cutting the music and the Family and Consumer Science (FACS) programs.

"Nobody wants to cut any of these

programs," MSD board president Bill deVergie said.

Board member Tom Allen asked to delay on any decisions about these two program cuts until after the public meeting scheduled for May 8.

The MSD board is considering not hiring teachers to replace Bob Eggebraten (band and choir director) or Cortney Aldridge (FACS) next fall. Both resigned last month for personal reasons. Due to the specialized skills and certifications required by these positions, the programs supported by these teachers would likely end.

After the public input portion at the board meeting, there weren't many dry eyes in the room due to the personal appeals brought by teachers, stu-

Ag & Business Day means Temple Grandin, annual After Birth Ball

MEEKER Saturday activities in Meeker will be educational and entertaining for nearly everyone, whether your interests are business, agriculture or good old-time dancing and dining fun.

Agriculture, general business education, the "State of the County" address and renowned livestock handler and autism expert Temple Grandin are all on the agenda during the day, followed by the After Birth Ball Saturday night.

Sponsored by the Meeker Chamber of Commerce and the Friends of the Meeker FFA Alumni, the second annual Ag and Business Summit will run from 9:30 a.m. with registration to 5 p.m. at Meeker High School, and the After Birth Ball's social hour breaks out at 5:30 p.m. at the Freeman E. Fairfield Center, 200 E. Main St.

The highlight of the day will be the appearance of Temple Grandin, who will be the keynote speaker for the Ag and Business Summit, starting at 4 p.m..

During the day and starting at 10 a.m. at the high school, there will be a number of workshop sessions followed by a lunch from 11:45 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. More workshops fill the afternoon, leading up to Grandin's address.

The 10 to 10:45 a.m. workshop sessions will address site monitoring; Facebook Part I; and the 2014 Farm Bill.

Workshop session II runs from 11 to 11:45 p.m. with ballot initiatives; business strategies; and Facebook Part 2.

Lunch will run from 11:45 a.m. to 12:45 p.m. Food will be available for purchase from the Meeker FFA chapter or attendees can bring their own lunch or get lunch on their own.

From 12:30 to 1:30 p.m. will be the Rio Blanco County "State of the County" address.

Workshop session III runs 1:45 to 2:30 p.m. and will address public land issues (a panel discussion); community counts; and how to fool Mother Nature in gardening.

Workshop session IV runs 2:45 to

3:30 p.m. The sessions will address how to use a computer; livestock ultrasound; estate planning; and insider tips for business funding.

Dr. Grandin is a designer of livestock-handling facilities and a professor of animal science at Colorado State University. Facilities she has designed are located in the United States, Canada, Europe, Mexico, Australia, New Zealand and other countries.

In North America, according to her website, almost half of the cattle are handled in a center track restrainer system she designed for meat plants. Curved chute and race systems she has designed for cattle are used worldwide and her writings on the flight zone and other principles of grazing animal behavior have helped many people reduce stress on their animals during handling.

She has also developed an objective scoring system for assessing handling of cattle and pigs at meat plants. This scoring system is being used by many large corporations to improve animal welfare. Other areas of her research include cattle temperament, environmental enrichment for pigs, reducing dark cutters and bruises, bull fertility, training procedures and effective stunning methods for cattle and pigs at meat plants.

She obtained her bachelor of arts degree at Franklin Pierce College and her master of science degree in animal science at Arizona State University. Dr. Grandin received her Ph.D. in animal science from the University of Illinois in 1989.

Today, she teaches courses on livestock behavior and facility design at Colorado State University in Fort Collins and consults with the livestock industry on facility design, livestock handling and animal welfare.

She has appeared on television shows such as "20/20," "48 Hours," "Larry King Live," "PrimeTime Live," "60 Minutes," "The Today Show" and many shows in other countries. She has been featured in People Magazine, the New York Times, Forbes, U.S. News and World Report, Time Magazine, the New

Would you like to have the opportunity to schedule a doctor's appointment on a Saturday? As a community working together, we can make these changes happen.

We have a great facility, but we need changes to make the most of it. A quarterly town meeting should be held by the Hospital's Administration to address the working state of the Hospital and field questions from the public. Our Hospital faces economic uncertainty under the Affordable Healthcare Act, and an outside audit would better reflect the financial health of the facility. In addition, the layout and architecture of the new Hospital are both incredible, and it's time we bring the landscape up to that standard. As a community, let's help make these changes.

Tipton fights group to keep energy costs low

RBC I U.S. Rep. Tipton (R-CO) reported recently that a radical litigation group is attempting to manipulate the marketplace and drive up electricity costs for rural Colorado families.

During a House Natural Resources Water and Power Subcommittee oversight hearing, Tipton raised concerns over a recent letter addressed to the Western Area Power Administration (WAPA) by Wild Earth Guardians, demanding that

WAPA force its customers to prioritize certain sources of energy over others.

"The Wild Earth Guardians letter, which reads like a blueprint for a lawsuit, demands that WAPA force non-federal entities to take up the Wild Earth Guardians' agenda at rate-payer expense and in derogation of their goals and WAPA's core mission, which is to provide low cost energy," Tipton said. "This litigation threat letter singles out certain rural electric cooperatives which provide power to thousands of homes and businesses in

the 3rd District of Colorado, and specifically targets the Craig Generating Station.

"Put bluntly, Wild Earth Guardians asks that WAPA stop approving power sales to entities that continue to provide low-cost, reduced-emission energy from the Craig Station in my district," he said. "This is market manipulation at its worst and it calls on rural families and small businesses to pay the tab for Wild Earth Guardians' unfounded demands."

The Craig Generating Station on the Western Slope of Colorado

provides more than 300 jobs and produces reliable, low-cost energy for families and small businesses.

WAPA Administrator Mark Gabriel testified that the legal threats made in the Wild Earth Guardians letter "certainly could" threaten the availability of affordable energy for families already struggling to pay the bills in the region.

Tipton stressed that "keeping energy costs low helps small businesses, struggling young families and senior citizens on fixed incomes."

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Our Holy God (5)

Ye shall be holy: for I the LORD your God am holy. (Lev. 19:2).

Because God is holy and has imparted holiness to us through Christ, we are to live a holy life. Holy living is not an option; it is a command. Leviticus 18–20 outlines laws regulating personal standards and relationships, including: marriages, sexual relationships, idolatry, spiritism, and various immoralities. Right in the heart of this dissertation we find our text. Here is God's demand for holiness from His people; He demands holiness because He is holy. A virtually identical command appears in 11:44–45, and its context (chs. 11–15) again concerns practical matters of holiness, including purity in relation to: food, child bearing, leprosy, and personal hygiene. So, in every aspect of life the Jew was to be pure because God is pure.

Turning to the New Testament, we encounter 1 Peter 1:15–16, which is actually a quotation of Leviticus 11:44–45. Does this imply a tying together of the Old Testament and New Testament in regard to the area of practical holiness? It would seem so. While this does *not* mean we today are to live under the Mosaic Law, it does mean that pure living has not really changed much over the centuries as far as God's viewpoint is concerned. We, therefore, again see two broad principles.

First, applying God's holiness creates a *solemnity* in our approach to Him. A popular approach to God typical of our day is He is our "buddy" and "pal." This comes partly from a misunderstanding of the term "Abba Father." Such over-familiarity, however, is improper. While God is certainly our Father, and while it is true the Jesus is our "elder brother" (Rom. 8:29), we must still come before God in awe of His holiness. We must never bring Him down to our level with our flippant, earthly, irreverent attitudes.

What then is the correct approach? We approach God with reverence and awe. In Exodus 3:3–5, we read that God *called* Moses to draw near, but He also *cautioned* Him to neither come *too* near lest he violate God's holiness nor come *rashly* lest he be irreverent.

We should also consider again the six-winged cherubims ("burning ones") before God's throne (Is. 6:1–3). With one set of wings they cover their feet, a less honourable

member of the body than any other. With another set they cover their faces "because they cannot bear the dazzling lustre of the Divine glory, and because, being conscious of an infinite distance from the Divine perfection, they are ashamed to show their faces before the holy God."

Should our approach to God be any less reverent? Sadly, as A. W. Tozer lamented in the mid 20th-century, there is in much of the Church "little sense of the divine Presence, no moment of stillness, no solemnity, no wonder, no holy fear."

Second, applying God's holiness creates a *sanctity* in every area of life. Or attitude toward God should be to emulate His unchanging holiness. How, then, do we manifest holiness?

(1) Purity in sexual relationships. Leviticus 18–20 is a terrible catalog of impure sexual relationships. Not only does this stress that sexual relations must be *within* marriage, but it also dictates the right *kind* of marriage. These basic morals continue to be ignored in our ever degenerating culture.

(2) Purity in worship. Leviticus 19 also declares that *only* God is to be worshipped. No idol was ever to be worshipped, nor was *any* image of God to be made. Moreover, no type of divination was ever to be sought or any occult practice observed. All this is still true in this age.

(3) Purity in our dealings with men. Again in Leviticus 19 we read how God expects his people to deal with one another. They should provide for the needy (v. 10), not steal, deal falsely, or cheat one another (v. 11), not oppress one another (v. 13), not show partiality (v. 15), not slander or gossip (v. 16), not be vengeful or bear a grudge (v. 18), and in general, just love one another (v. 18). Every one of these is, of course, a New Testament principle of conduct.

Rangely Little League teams raise money

RANGELY | Three new Rangely Little League teams will spend the next month trying to meet a \$1,500 to \$2,000 fundraising goal for costs associated with joining the league, coach and organizer Jerry LeBleu said this week.

"All the teams are going in together to raise the money," LeBleu said. "Whoever raises the most at the

end of the season will get to get on the field with (minors team) the Grand Junction Rockies. So there's some motivation for them."

So far, local businesses have donated approximately \$600 toward fundraising costs, and Little League organizers hope that promoting games, offering concessions at upcoming home series and a car wash next month will help bridge the gap.

In the meantime, the Cardinals have already won two of their four games, losing a third by just one run.

In February, LeBleu approached the Western Rio Blanco Metropolitan (WRBM) Recreation and Park District about starting up Little League, with seasons beginning earlier this month and scheduled through the end of May. LeBleu felt the town needed an option to further elementary and middle school players' experience and abilities before they reach high school.

Now, he said, kids begin the sea-

parents and former students. Most in the audience gave examples of how skills taught by the music and FACS programs have helped students build foundations for current and future success.

"There are so many stories like this," said Becky Ridings after relating the story of a shy freshman who overcame his fear of public speaking to win the gold medal for a presentation in front of 11,000 at the Family, Career and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) Nationals.

Aly Ridings read a letter from her sister, Megan, about the importance of band and FACS for getting through college, landing her dream job and starting a family.

"These programs offer practical skills and opportunities that spill over into other classrooms," MHS math and science teacher Dr. Bob Dorsett said.

FACS teacher Cortney Aldridge spoke to the board about the substantial improvement to the budget that she expected to occur next year due to a better accounting of the costs and students in the FACS program. Many of the costs can be reimbursed by the Colorado Department of Education (CDE) and a portion of the FACS position is directly reimbursed by CDE, she said.

Another concern is the potential loss of the FCCLA chapter in Meeker. Aldridge is certified to teach FACS and is the adviser for FCCLA. Only leaders certified to teach FACS or with special permission from CDE can serve as an FCCLA adviser.

Aldridge said that at least 28 years have been invested in the FCCLA program in Meeker and there are only a few districts on the Western Slope that have been as successful.

Sophomore Caitlyn Shepherd said she uses the skills she has learned in FACS everyday and said the MSD board should look at anything and everything before cutting FACS or the music programs.

Band and choir director Bob

EGGEBRATEN wanted the board to know the effect on students if the music program isn't continued. Losing the band and choir program would mean music would not be taught beyond elementary school.

Eggebraten warned that a lapse of two or three years in the band and choir program would require the next music director to start in the first year of junior high, and it may take eight years to achieve the level where students are now as seniors.

Kent Walter, who has lived in Meeker since 2001, has had two kids graduate from Meeker with four years of high school band. He said he hopes that his youngest daughter will have the same opportunity. Walter said music education is important to our community in order to attract new families looking for a quality education.

Meyer said he is following the model of cuts through attrition. He recommended at the last board meeting that the board not fill behind the two teachers.

Many in the public questioned the wisdom of the attrition policy since it would result in losing two programs that clearly benefit students, especially when they are so successful and take so much time to build.

Board member Mindy Burke wondered if other program cuts such as art or athletics might result in a similar outpouring of support.

Board member Marnell Bradfield added, "Nothing is easy to cut at this point."

The Colorado Senate recently increased the negative factor reduction proposed in this year's education bill to \$120 million, up from the \$110 million approved by the House.

Meyer said a budget proposal needs to be turned into the CDE on May 20 for FY 2015-16. He added that decisions on contract retentions should be completed by May 1.

The April 30 MSD board work session will evaluate programs, address potential program cuts and decide on subsequent contract renewals for next year, Meyer said.

York Times book review, and Discover magazine.

In 2010, Time Magazine named her one of the 100 most influential people on earth.

Her life story has also been made into an HBO movie titled "Temple Grandin," starring Claire Danes, which won seven Emmy awards and a Golden Globe. The movie shows her life as a teenager and how she started her career.

Regarding autism, it is said, "If algebra had been a required course for college graduation in 1967, there would be no Temple Grandin. At least, no Temple Grandin as the world knows her today: professor, inventor, best-selling author and rock star in the seemingly divergent fields of animal science and autism education."

"I can't do algebra; it makes no sense," she said. "Why does algebra have to be the gateway to all the other mathematics?"

Grandin didn't talk until she was three and a half years old, communicating her frustration instead by screaming, peeping and humming. In 1950, she was diagnosed with autism and her parents were told she should be institutionalized.

She tells her story of "groping her way from the far side of darkness" in her book "Emergence: Labeled Autistic," a book that stunned the world because, until its publication, most professionals and parents assumed that an autism diagnosis was virtually a death sentence to achievement or productivity in life.

Grandin has become a prominent author and speaker on the subject of autism because "I have read enough to know that there are still many parents, and yes, professionals too, who believe that 'once autistic, always autistic.' This dictum has meant sad and sorry lives for many children diagnosed, as I was in early life, as autistic. To these people, it is incomprehensible that the characteristics of autism can be modified and controlled. However, I feel strongly that I am

living proof that they can."

She has now designed the facilities in which half the cattle are handled in the United States, consulting for firms such as Burger King, McDonald's, Swift Meats and others.

Temple Grandin is now the most accomplished and well-known adult with autism in the world.

This is the second year for the Ag and Business Summit. The idea was conceived and well received last year as a way to bring business people, farmers and ranchers into town for more of the day leading up to the After Birth Ball, a long-held tradition in the spring.

The 9 p.m. After Birth Ball is free to all wanting to attend. Music will be provided by the band "Already Gone."

Mine in 2005. He was on the Rangely Rural Fire Protection District board for eight years, four of them as its chairman, and on the East Carbon City Council in Utah. Brady currently owns the Rangely Liquor Store.

If elected, he believes he can help address one specific issue among others community members have voiced about RDH.

"The biggest concern I hear from the residents of Rangely is that they cannot go up there and see the same doctor every time," he said. "That is the No. 1 issue. And I think there have been some failures in getting full-time doctors here."

Along with helping facilitate funding to draw and keep full-time doctors, Brady said a board's central role is to give the hospital's director guidance.

Michael Dillon, a technician for the Town of Rangely gas department, said that while relevant past experience includes writing for and designing the local college newspaper and being an active member of the Elks Club, his real strength is seeing things from a resident's perspective.

"I'm just starting out, but I'm very community-minded," he said. "Being an active member of the community, I see things the way everybody else in the community sees it, and that's who I want to please the most."

Dillon said he plans to raise a family in Rangely and that his motivation for running is to help develop a strong facility with a good reputation that will someday provide quality care to his children.

Keeping good physicians in Rangely is also a priority, Dillon said.

"I went down to Grand Junction the other day to see a specialist, and I couldn't put down who my primary care doctor is because I don't know who that is," he said. "At the same time, I have met the new doctors (Rieves and Aguirre) and I really like them. I want to see how we can keep them here."

Dillon said that before he can advocate for the board to take certain steps, he would need to be on it for some time to better understand the hospital's circumstances and needs.

Jason Kurrasch, a field manager for Baker-Hughes Well Service, said daily work with financial reports, oversight of account managers and relationship building with customers have

provided him relevant experience to be on the board.

He hopes to be elected to build and strengthen community ties.

"At the heart of it, I want to be involved in the community," he said. "Rangely's somewhere I want to stay. I love being here. I grew up here ... being able to give something back would give me some sense of a bond to the community."

Kurrasch said he wants to address negative community perceptions of the hospital and learn how a board fits into changing those perceptions.

"The hospital's been looked at negatively from circumstances that were out of their control," he said. "It's hard to prepare for doctors leaving in the manner they did. From that position, I want to fit a puzzle piece, understand what the current board is and fill a role in it."

Jennifer Moore has been an administrative assistant to Alliance Energy Service Co. (AESC) general managers for the past 3.5 years, working with safety regulations and accounts payable and receivable.

Relevant experience, she said, includes 10 years in the public sector and degrees in business administration, agri-business and agri-production. Family encouragement also motivated her decision to run.

"My uncle has always put great emphasis on community support and getting involved in the community," she said. "This is a good opportunity for me to get involved. I have a house here. I work here. I hope to stay here the rest of my life."

Moore said a board's role at RDH is oversight, not just of the needs of the facility and staff but for patients in the community.

"The board needs to focus on customer service to get the community to believe in the hospital again," she said. "Lots of people don't even go to this facility, so that's a big focus. Retention is the other. We've had lots of doctors over the years and we need to focus on finding the right doctors — ones who want to stay here in Rangely."

Tad Moss, a former employee of RDH, works in disposals for RNI Trucking. His background in construction and agriculture, he said, along with working for large companies, has prepared him for a seat on the board.

If elected, Moss wants the community to have venues for expressing ideas and concerns

and for the board to act on that input. He said he would also focus on holding administrators responsible for their decisions.

"A few people are making choices for the many, and whether the choices are good or bad, they're not held accountable for their actions," he said. "I'd like to have a town meeting every quarter to have everybody come together with department heads and pose questions. Are we making headway? What do we need to change? ... Instead of the double-talk the community's getting now."

He said the hospital needs more community involvement to ensure the board represents the interests of the people it serves.

"People shouldn't be able to influence the board to take the direction they want," Moss said. "The board needs to actually be about checks and balances. That goes along with fiscal responsibility as well as ensuring employees aren't just getting a paycheck, but actually earning a paycheck."

AESC health, safety and environment specialist Nathaniel (Nate) Polley said his experience working with different kinds of people in a variety of work and other environments will be useful if he is elected.

"I want to give back to my community and plan to be a resident for many years to come," he said. "I want to help our town stay what it is."

Polley said that while the hospital could focus more on customer service, he has come into the election without specific expectations of what he wants to support or change.

"I don't really have an agenda," he said. "I just want to contribute. There's nothing I see that I have to fix; I just want to be part of our community."

He added that the "blank slate" position could be an asset to the RDH board.

"Sometimes it's good to have an outside perspective from someone who hasn't been directly involved," he said. "New people who haven't had a lot of experience that way and don't have preset notions can help."

Residents can complete separate ballots for the hospital and WRBM candidates at the Rangely Town Hall on May 6 from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Although this is not a mail-in ballot election, voters have until May 2 to apply for absentee ballots.

Separate forms must be filled out for each district and can be picked up at Rangely District Hospital and the rec center.






